




The Guild Challenge - Glorious Food

Create a small quilt (16" x 18") with reference to food appropriate for one of the four seasons of the year. These quilts can be pieced blocks, appliqué, abstract, scenic landscape, whimsical or artistic. What ever technique and style you want. You may even want to do your "comfort food" that was relied upon during the past year that would cover all 4 seasons! Or illustrate some of your newly discovered recipes since Covid started. Use your imagination to create something tasty or didn't turn out quite the quite the way you wanted!

A quilter can create up to **four** quilt pieces but only **one** for each season. The deadline will be April 5, 2022 when you will display your quilt at the April meeting.

Quilted pieces can be entered into the Guild Quilt Show in May 2022.







Featured Speaker Janet Barker

Janet was educated as an engineer and worked as a geophysicist for thirty years in Calgary. Her quilting journey started in the year 2000 with a new millennium resolution – to use up her many bits of leftover garment fabric in quilts (Ha – did she have a lot to learn!). She quickly discovered that she spent more time analyzing patterns than following them, always trying to build a better mousetrap. She was soon designing and selling original quilt designs, and teaching those patterns followed shortly thereafter. Janet has taught for guilds or at conferences coast to coast in Canada, including Mahone Bay in N.S. and at Quilt Canada in Vancouver in 2018. Her latest effort has been virtual lectures and workshops in an effort to stay connected during Covid19; this included a lecture at the virtual Quilt Canada in June of 2021.



Janet maintains an online quilt design business through her Etsy shop, jb.quiltdesigns. She was a frequent contributor to Quilter's Connection magazine before the editor retired, with her quilts often featured on the cover. She has also been published in Canadian Quilter magazine and The Quilt Pattern Magazine. She teaches workshops, designs and sells patterns (both online and wholesale), and sits on the committee for the Heritage Park Festival of Quilts in Calgary. Her love of colour and anything scrappy (with an emphasis on *organized scrappy*) is renowned.

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

Join Janet for a full day to create this 19" x 48" wall hanging featuring five colourful fish families. Simple 3D or One-Seam Flying Geese have been stretched and stacked to make this small guilt. Learn this technique with Janet and master most of the wall hanging in this workshop. The course will also include a discussion on how to quilt this style of quilt, as well as fabric choices if you wish to enlarge the wall hanging to a lap or twin quilt size. The required pattern (includes the wall hanging and various guilt sizes) is included in the course fee.

<u>Kawandi</u>

The traditional Kawandi is a hand-stitched quilt, made by the The Siddis of East Africa descent and living in India. Their quilts are distinctive in their use of color and the technique used in which patches of repurposed clothing are placed over a cotton sari foundation and hand stitched with a running stitch. This technique is more like applique than sewing the pieces together.

Description

For this workshop we are going to make a Kawandi placemat. With only fabric, thread/ floss, scissors, needles and a thimble, you will use a running stitch to create a unique pieces of functional art.

No sewing machine required.

Supply List

1 fat quarter fabric for backing

Piece of batting that is half inch smaller than the width and length of the backing material 10 to 12 pieces of various colored fabrics approximately 7 x 7 inches each Hand quilting needle (larger the eye the easier it will be to thread) 12 weight thread or embroidery floss (I will bring some spools of floss that they may want to use) Scissors Straight Pins Needle threader Thimble (optional) Notebook/ paper Pen/Pencil



Tips from Bonnie

Tip 1- cut the fabric length wise and, cut the fabric a little longer cut to $12 \frac{1}{2}$ " and once all stripes are sewn together trim to $11 \frac{1}{2}$ " then add the 1"x $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " strips on each end. **Tip 2** sew one colour 1 and one colour 5 1" strip together and measure to see if the sewn piece is $1 \frac{1}{2}$ ". If your seam allowance is to narrow trim to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ " and if your seam allowance is too big redo your seam. Keep measuring as you add more stripes. **Tip 3** One of your outside stripes is cut $1\frac{1}{2} \times 12\frac{1}{2}$ instead of cut $1\frac{3}{4} \times 12\frac{1}{2}$ and once all stripes are sewn together trim the outside edge to make block $6\frac{1}{2}$ wide



Made 2 – 6 ½ x 18 ½ 5 stripes

The Mystery Blocks all involve stripes, very narrow stripes, most of the stripes' width finishing at 1/2.

Strongly recommended: cut the strips *parallel* to the selvage to avoid or at least keep to a minimum warped or wobbly stripes.

This is also an exercise in precision and proper pressing technique. Recommended: Dry iron. Heat set seam; finger press, then use the iron in a pressing, not ironing motion. Press to the darker colour, or at least all in the same direction. Or use your preferred method to keep the seams straight. Because the finished width is so narrow, and the blocks are quite long, even 1-2 thread widths will create a noticeable wobble.

Also **recommended** is to cut the strips $12 \frac{1}{2}$ (or $18 \frac{1}{2}$) sew all the strips together, then trim the block to $11 \frac{1}{2}$ ($17 \frac{1}{2}$). All 5 of the blocks have a $1^{"} \times 6 \frac{1}{2}$ strip on each of their short ends.

For the wider, long outside strip on one side of each the 5 blocks, instead of cutting $1 \frac{1}{2}$, cut to $1 \frac{3}{4}$ width and then trim make the block $6 \frac{1}{2}$ wide.

You will have 5 separate blocks:

2 - 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " with 4 stripes of Colour 5 and 5 stripes of Colour 1 1 - 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " with 5 stripes of Colour 5 and 6 stripes of Colour 1 2 - 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ " with 5 stripes of Colour 5 and 6 stripes of Colour 1

Needed: Colour 1 Colour 5

For the 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ with 4 stripes of Colour 5 From Colour 5 Cut 8 - 1" x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", see above and trim once all sewn together) From Colour 1 Cut 8 - 1" x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " as above) Cut 2 - 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", as above) Cut 4 - 1" x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " Make 2, assemble as shown in the first diagram (top left).

For the 6 ½" x 12 ½ with 5 stripes of Colour 5

From Colour 5 Cut 5 - 1" x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", see above and trim once all sewn together) From Colour 1 Cut 5 - 1" x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", as above) Cut 1 - 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", as above) Cut 2 - 1" x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " Make 1, assemble as shown in the second diagram (top right).

For the 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ with 5 stripes of Colour 5 From Colour 5 Cut 10 - 1" x 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", see above and trim once all sewn together) From Colour 1 Cut 10 - 1" x 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (or 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", as above) Cut 2 - 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " or 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", as above) Cut 4 - 1" x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " Make 2 assemble as shown in the third diagram (bottom)



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



The child of Ghanaian immigrants, Esi Edugyan was born and raised in Calgary, where her father was an economist and her mother was a nurse. She and her family experienced racism and discrimination throughout her childhood, and she has spoken of being terrified by a Ku Klux Klan crossburning incident in Provost, Alberta, when she was 12.





<u>https://</u> www.thecanadianencyclopedia.c <u>a/en/article/esi-edugyan</u> Esi Edugyan's work exhibits her interest in Black histories and the Black diaspora, which in turn reflects the concerns that frequently characterize Black Canadian writing. Her work explores notions of nation and belonging — to new and old cultures and countries, to "here" and "away," to the present and the past. Edugyan simultaneously examines the effects of Black migration and the resulting presence of Black subjects in predominantly white societies.

In 2013, Edugyan addressed the topic of "home" in the University of Alberta's annual Henry Kreisel Memorial Lecture Series (*see also* Henry Kreisel). Her lecture, published in March 2014 as *Dreaming of Elsewhere: Observations on Home*, blends fiction and fact "in an effort to find out if one can belong to more than one place, if home is just a place or if it can be an idea, a person, a memory, or a dream." Edugyan writes about her experiences with racism — of being "an apparition so dark and odd people in the street sometimes paused to watch me pass" — as well as the experiences of Mathieu de Costa, the first Black person in Canada, and Olivier le Jeune, the first slave.



- What: An opportunity to sell your unused guilting fabrics and supplies so that you can turn them into cold hard cash and buy new quilting treasures! Well priced goods can net a significant payout. We will sell your items for a 20% commission that goes back to the Guild. We will also be accepting donations of items from Guild members as a Guild fundraiser.
- Things that sell well: quilting fabrics or scraps priced for quick sale; patterns; quilt kits; magazines; quilting books; rulers; etc. All items went quickly at the last Quilt Show, especially books and magazines (no older than 10 years old please). Larger items that were priced for quick sale sold well too.
- Where: Callie Curling Club, within the area of the Quilt Show, with a visible sign or banner.
- When: The quilt show will be held Friday and Saturday May 6 & 7, 2022.
- Item Drop off: Sherrill and her Committee will be at the Callie Curling Club on Thursday, May 5th, between 10 - 6 pm to check in your premarked items. If this time will not work for you, you can make other arrangements by calling or texting Sherrill @ (639) 915-0314. You will need to mark and record your own items so be prepared to take the time!! Please mark items in amounts of \$2 or higher. We will use the double tag approach again, plus record sheets with your vendor number and desired price on them. To make effective tags, simply sew a line of holes along the long side of an index card and cut your tags, marking on both your vendor number and your desired price. Contact



Sherrill to get your "vendor number" and the forms early so that you can do this at home.

- Unsold Item Pick up: Saturday, May 7th anytime after 6:00 pm. You will be given your sale amounts in envelopes, less the 20% Guild commission, at the June 2022 Guild meeting.
- Things to Think About: if you are offering goods for sale, please consider volunteering for a shift at the Guild Table (it is fun anyway!). Don't be afraid to bring larger items – we have even sold sewing machines in the past! FQ's and yardage sells better when presented in Ziploc bags; many Ziploc bags also have a white space that you can mark your price and vendor number on. Larger clear plastic food trays also display nicely. Coordinated grouped FQ's sold well. Packing tape, painter's tape and masking tape usually sticks well but not always. If you are using stick-on labels, test them at home to make sure they stick! If we don't know who owns it, we can't sell it! Good quality scraps can be sold in larger zip lock bags.

Suggested prices (NOT written in stone!): Four or

five magazines tied up with curly ribbon sold for \$3.00; Patterns \$2 each or up to 50% off retail price; Fat Quarters \$1-2 each depending on quality - remember that some vendors will be selling theirs for \$2.00+; Older books \$3 or \$4 and newer books can sell for up to 50% off retail price. The quilts for the Quilt Show Raffle have been completed. We have two prizes this year.



The first is from a pattern called Tranquility. It was especially designed for this show by Tannis Fahlman and the pattern is only being used for this special quilt – making it absolutely unique. The top was made by Heather Innis, and it was quilted by Lois Gagnon. The fabric was supplied by Cindy-rellas.

This quilt is a great comfort quilt. It is 62" by 62" (155 cm x 155 cm) with a backing of minky - perfect for a lap quilt.



The second prize is a Christmas wall hanging. It was donated to Connecting Threads by Lynn Tomkins. It is 25" by 32" (63 cm x 81 cm), and would be an excellent addition to anyone's home. The hanging includes a sleeve for the rod to hang it. The creation of the wall hanging was a true group effort. A panel with some embroidery on it was donated to Connecting Threads. Lynn took the panel, got embroidery thread from one friend, buttons from a second friend, fabric for the border from a third friend and did the embroidery, assembling and quilting of the hanging herself.

Quilt Categories



S-1: Max perimeter 160". Hand or machine quilted.

M-2: **Hand Quilted or Hand Applique.** Made and hand quilted and/or hand appliqued by you Max perimeter 280".

M-3: **Self-machine quilted.** Max perimeter 280". Made and quilted by you on any size machine. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

M-4: **Machine quilted by someone else.** Max perimeter 280". Stipulate whether using long arm, sit-down machine, pantograph, computerized program, and/or stitch regulator.

M-5: **Kit, Workshop, or Store Sample** Max perimeter 280". Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

L-6: **Hand Quilted or Hand Applique**. Made and hand quilted and/or hand appliqued by you. More than 280" perimeter.

L-7: **Self-machine quilted**. More than 280" perimeter. Made and quilted by you on any size machine. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, pantograph, computerized program, and/or stitch regulator.

L-8: **Machine quilted by someone else.** More than 280" perimeter. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph, and/or stitch regulator.

L-9: **Kit, Workshop, or Store Sample** More than 280" perimeter. Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator. I-10: **Innovative Quilt.** Maximum perimeter 280". Enter the brave new world of art quilts. Show us your original creation, using a variety of materials, not from a pattern or kit. Three dimensional elements such as fabric folding or embellishments are applicable. Be sure to list all of the interesting materials you used.

11: **New Generation Quilters.** For quilters 16 years of age or younger, this is for you. Quilt of any size using any technique.

12: **Group Quilt.** Completed by 3 or more people, any size. What have you and your quilting friends stitched up lately?

13: **Recycled.** Give recycled fabrics or material a second life, any size. 50% of the top must be from recycled fabric or material. Tell us what you started with..

14: **Modern Quilt.** Max 240" perimeter. Modern bed or wall quilts depict modern design and demonstrate personal expression and originality in the design, colour and/or techniques. Minimalism, asymmetry, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work are often a part of modern quilt compositions, as are improvisational piecing and solid fabrics. (Taken from CQA National Juried Show) Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

15: **Modern Quilt** More than 240" perimeter, Modern quilt as described in 14. Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

16: **Assorted Quilted Items**: table cloths, placemats, runners, bowls & boxes, bags, cushions, etc. Three dimensional elements or garments.



Registration is open for the Prairie Piecemakers Quilters' Guild, *Lasting Imprint 2022* quilt show. There is no limit to the number of items you can enter, but please complete an entry form for each one. Members are free; non-members are required to submit a \$15 entry fee for all entries. 
PROJECT.

Nine Indigenous artists from Saskatchewan designed original artwork incorporating children's footprints, according to each artist's unique style. These designs were used to place hundreds of footprints in Downtown Regina and in the Warehouse District, either as stencils temporarily painted onto sidewalks or as posters hung in vacant storefronts.

This project is focused on honouring, and raising awareness of, the numerous Indigenous children and adults who have walked through Saskatchewan's residential school system – those who have survived, and those who have not. We hope for continued healing and reconciliation among all our relations, in all our communities.

The Canadian government introduced the *Digital News Subscription Tax Credit* that Regina Leader Post subscribers can claim on their personal income tax and benefit return from the years 2020 to 2024.
