


If you are unable to attend a workshop, please notify a member of the Workshop Committee. You will find Workshop Lead contact information on the page 2 of this newsletter.

Jan 2022 Mystery Quilt

Make 2 - 6 ½ x 6 ½

Make 1 - 6 ½ x 6 ½

For the 6 ½" Square in a Square, (to *finish* at 6"):


- Needed: Colour 1 (background) Colour 2 Colour 4 Useful: 6 ½" square ruler
- Cutting:Colour 2: Cut 2 4 ¾" squaresColour 4: Cut 1 4 ¾" squareColour 1: Cut 6 4 ¼" square, cut diagonally once

Sewing: Sew **Colour 1** Triangles to **Colour 2** and **Colour 4** squares as shown in Step 1 and Step 2.


Trimming: Position 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square ruler with $\frac{1}{4}$ " as shown by 4 green pointers in Step 3. Trim to 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square, making sure each point is $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the point of the square.

You will have **2 Colour 2** blocks and **1 Colour 4** Block. These are "stand alone"; set aside.

Make 1 - 12 ½ x 6 ½ (colour 4)

Make 2 - 12 ½ x 6 ½ (colour 2)

For the 6 ½ x 12 ½ Block:

Needed: Colour 1 Colour 2 Colour 4 Useful - 4 ½" square ruler

Cutting: Colour 2: Cut 4 - 3 3/8" square Cut 4 - 3 ¼" square cut diagonally once.
Colour 4: Cut 1 - 3 3/8" square Cut 4 - 3 ¼" square cut diagonally once. (corrected)
Colour 1: Cut 4 - 3 3/8" square Cut 10 - 3 ¼" square cut diagonally once Cut 10 - 3 ¼" square cut diagonally once Cut 6 - 1 ½" x 12 ½" rectangles.

Sewing: Make 4 - 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " blocks using Colour 2 as the centre block and Colour 1 HST. See steps 1, 2, and 3, above. Make 2 - 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " blocks using Colour 1 for the centre black and Colour 2 HST triangles.

Make 1- 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " block using **Colour 4** as the centre block and **Colour 1** HST. Make 4 – 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " blocks using **Colour 1** for the centre block and **Colour 4** HST triangles.


Trimming: Trim the blocks with the $4 \frac{1}{2}$ " square ruler as show above, making sure each point is $\frac{1}{2}$ " from the edge.


Sewing: Sew a $1 \frac{1}{2}$ " x $12 \frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle **colour 1** to each of the top and bottom of the block.

You will have 2 Colour 2 blocks and 1 Colour 4 - 6 1/2" x 12 1/2. Set aside.

BLOCK 3





For the 6 ½" x 18 ½" Block

Needed: Colour 1 Colour 2 Colour 4 Useful - 4 ½" square ruler

Cutting: Colour 1: Cut 3 - 3 3/8'' square (corrected) Cut 6 - 3 4'' square cut diagonally once Cut 4 - 1 $4''' \times 12 4''''$ Cut 2 - 4 $4''' \times 6 4''''$ Cut 2 - 2 $4''' \times 6 4'''$

> Colour 2: Cut - 2- 3 3/8" square Cut - 2 - 3 ¼" square cut diagonal

Colour 4: Cut - 1 - 3 3/8" square

Cut - 4 - 3 ¼" square cut diagonally once


Sewing: Make $2 - 4 \frac{1}{2}$ " blocks using **Colour 2** as the centre block and **Colour 1** HST. See steps 1, 2, and 3, above. Make $1 - 4 \frac{1}{2}$ " blocks using **Colour 1** for the centre black and **Colour 2** HST triangles.

Make 1- 4 ½ block using **colour 4** as the centre block and **colour 1** HST. Make 2 – 4 ½ blocks using **colour 1** for the centre block and **colour 4** HST triangles

Sew a **Colour 1** centre Square in a Square block to each side of a **Colour 4** centre Block. Sew the $1 \frac{1}{2}$ " x $12 \frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle to top and bottom of the block. Sew the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " block to the left side and the $4 \frac{1}{2}$ " x $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " to the right side. You will now have a $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " x $18 \frac{1}{2}$ " block. Make 1 of each colour combination. Set aside.

When you have finished the square in a square January block, you will have:

- 3 6 1/2" square blocks
- 3 6 1/2" x 12 1/2" blocks
- 2 6 ½" x 18 ½" blocks.

Raffle tickets for quilt are now available at Connecting Threads. This is a major fund raiser for the group and unless we have the funds, we cannot purchase the batting and flannelette for our donation quilts. You can pick up a book (or 2 or 3) at Connecting Threads any Thur from Beth, Darlene or me. The draw will be made at the May Quilt Show. The quilt was designed by Tannis, sewn by Heather and quilted by Lois Gagnon. (see page 25)

We outdid ourselves this year!!!! Even though we didn't start meeting until Sept, we donated the following items:

- 661 quilts to NICU, Peds/Adolescent Units at RGH and Wascana Rehab, Allan Blair Cancer Clinic, CardioScience Unit at RGH for adults with advanced cancer, and 4 Directions Community Health Centre.
- 347 placemats to Meals on Wheels for distribution to their 21 outlets
- 126 pillowcases to the 3 women's shelters Regina Transition House, WISH Safe House and the YWCA's Isabelle Johnson Shelter.

This brings a 7 year total of 3542 quilts, 2012 placemats and 1631 pillowcases.

We will start again Thur Jan 6.

Deborah Chatsis is a member of the Ahtahkakoop First Nation. She had a long and varied career in Ottawa and abroad as a member of Canada's Foreign Service since 1989. During that time, she served in Beijing, Bogotá, Miami, Geneva, New York City, Hanoi, and Guatemala, from where she also covered Belize.

She served as Canada's Ambassador to Vietnam, Canada's Ambassador to Guatemala, and High Commissioner to Belize. At Headquarters, she served with the Legal Operations and Human Rights divisions as Chief of Staff to the Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs and as Executive Director for South Asia Relations.

Ms. Chatsis also served on secondment to Indian Affairs and Northern Affairs Canada as senior advisor, Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada, and the Privy Council Office as senior

advisor, Social Policy Development Secretariat.




The guild challenge is using the theme lasting impressions.

Make a small quilt that expresses something that has left a lasting impression on you.

Awards

Best Theme Best Use of Colour Best Use of Thread Best Use of Applique Best Free Motion Quilting







- What: An opportunity to sell your unused guilting fabrics and supplies so that you can turn them into cold hard cash and buy new quilting treasures! Well priced goods can net a significant payout. We will sell your items for a 20% commission that goes back to the Guild. We will also be accepting donations of items from Guild members as a Guild fundraiser.
- Things that sell well: quilting fabrics or scraps priced for quick sale; patterns; quilt kits; magazines; quilting books; rulers; etc. All items went quickly at the last Quilt Show, especially books and magazines (no older than 10 years old please). Larger items that were priced for quick sale sold well too.
- Where: Callie Curling Club, within the area of the Quilt Show, with a visible sign or banner.
- When: The quilt show will be held Friday and Saturday May 6 & 7, 2022.
- Item Drop off: Sherrill and her Committee will be at the Callie Curling Club on Thursday, May 5th, between 10 - 6 pm to check in your premarked items. If this time will not work for you, you can make other arrangements by calling or texting Sherrill @ (639) 915-0314. You will need to mark and record your own items so be prepared to take the time!! Please mark items in amounts of \$2 or higher. We will use the double tag approach again, plus record sheets with your vendor number and desired price on them. To make effective tags, simply sew a line of holes along the long side of an index card and cut your tags, marking on both your vendor number and your desired price. Contact



Sherrill to get your "vendor number" and the forms early so that you can do this at home.

- Unsold Item Pick up: Saturday, May 7th anytime after 6:00 pm. You will be given your sale amounts in envelopes, less the 20% Guild commission, at the June 2022 Guild meeting.
- Things to Think About: if you are offering goods for sale, please consider volunteering for a shift at the Guild Table (it is fun anyway!). Don't be afraid to bring larger items – we have even sold sewing machines in the past! FQ's and yardage sells better when presented in Ziploc bags; many Ziploc bags also have a white space that you can mark your price and vendor number on. Larger clear plastic food trays also display nicely. Coordinated grouped FQ's sold well. Packing tape, painter's tape and masking tape usually sticks well but not always. If you are using stick-on labels, test them at home to make sure they stick! If we don't know who owns it, we can't sell it! Good quality scraps can be sold in larger zip lock bags.

Suggested prices (NOT written in stone!): Four or

five magazines tied up with curly ribbon sold for \$3.00; Patterns \$2 each or up to 50% off retail price; Fat Quarters \$1-2 each depending on quality - remember that some vendors will be selling theirs for \$2.00+; Older books \$3 or \$4 and newer books can sell for up to 50% off retail price. Donated books, magazines, and yardage are great Guild fundraisers if you choose to donate them. Looking forward to seeing you at the Quilt Show!



We Need to Sell Raffle Tickets!

The quilts for the Quilt Show Raffle have been completed. We have two prizes this year.



The first is from a pattern called Tranquility. It was especially designed for this show by Tannis Fahlman and the pattern is only being used for this special quilt – making it absolutely unique. The top was made by Heather Innis, and it was quilted by Lois Gagnon. The fabric was supplied by Cindy-rellas.

This quilt is a great comfort quilt. It is 62" by 62" (155 cm x 155 cm) with a backing of minky - perfect for a lap quilt.



The second prize is a Christmas wall hanging. It was donated to Connecting Threads by Lynn Tomkins. It is 25" by 32" (63 cm x 81 cm), and would be an excellent addition to anyone's home. The hanging includes a sleeve for the rod to hang it. The creation of the wall hanging was a true group effort. A panel with some embroidery on it was donated to Connecting Threads. Lynn took the panel, got embroidery thread from one friend, buttons from a second friend, fabric for the border from a third friend and did the embroidery, assembling and quilting of the hanging herself.

Quilt Categories



S-1: Max perimeter 160". Hand or machine quilted.

M-2: **Hand Quilted or Hand Applique.** Made and hand quilted and/or hand appliqued by you Max perimeter 280".

M-3: **Self-machine quilted.** Max perimeter 280". Made and quilted by you on any size machine. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

M-4: **Machine quilted by someone else.** Max perimeter 280". Stipulate whether using long arm, sit-down machine, pantograph, computerized program, and/or stitch regulator.

M-5: **Kit, Workshop, or Store Sample** Max perimeter 280". Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

L-6: **Hand Quilted or Hand Applique**. Made and hand quilted and/or hand appliqued by you. More than 280" perimeter.

L-7: **Self-machine quilted**. More than 280" perimeter. Made and quilted by you on any size machine. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, pantograph, computerized program, and/or stitch regulator.

L-8: **Machine quilted by someone else.** More than 280" perimeter. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph, and/or stitch regulator.

L-9: **Kit, Workshop, or Store Sample** More than 280" perimeter. Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator. I-10: **Innovative Quilt.** Maximum perimeter 280". Enter the brave new world of art quilts. Show us your original creation, using a variety of materials, not from a pattern or kit. Three dimensional elements such as fabric folding or embellishments are applicable. Be sure to list all of the interesting materials you used.

11: **New Generation Quilters.** For quilters 16 years of age or younger, this is for you. Quilt of any size using any technique.

12: **Group Quilt.** Completed by 3 or more people, any size. What have you and your quilting friends stitched up lately?

13: **Recycled.** Give recycled fabrics or material a second life, any size. 50% of the top must be from recycled fabric or material. Tell us what you started with..

14: **Modern Quilt.** Max 240" perimeter. Modern bed or wall quilts depict modern design and demonstrate personal expression and originality in the design, colour and/or techniques. Minimalism, asymmetry, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work are often a part of modern quilt compositions, as are improvisational piecing and solid fabrics. (Taken from CQA National Juried Show) Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

15: **Modern Quilt** More than 240" perimeter, Modern quilt as described in 14. Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.

16: **Assorted Quilted Items**: table cloths, placemats, runners, bowls & boxes, bags, cushions, etc. Three dimensional elements or garments.


