President's Message June 2020

Greetings



So, how have you all been coping with the new normal? Have you run out of project ideas or supplies? I miss seeing my quilting friends. I miss the Guild meetings, workshops, Connecting Threads Group and other spontaneous gatherings with fellow quilters. Quilting and socializing go hand-in-hand and is just as important today as it was a century ago.

The phases to re-open Saskatchewan remain the same; it will be Phase Five before we can gather for a general meeting. Since we don't know when that will be, steps were taken to move our Guild along and continue with business.

The Executive Committee met using Zoom (video communication), May 5. It was necessary to amend our Bylaws in order to hold that virtual meeting so changes were proposed and approved by the Executive Committee. At the same time amendments were made to allow electronic voting so we could hold our election for the 2020-2021 year. A copy of the proposed resolution will be sent to you prior to the SAGM when it will be ratified.

Another concern for the Executive Committee was voting privileges. Our Bylaws indicate you must be a paid member to vote, so none of us would be able to vote at a meeting held after June 30, 2020, without renewing our membership. Thank you for renewing your membership.

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
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PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE


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So what have you been doing while at home Sherrill T. ?


Here's what I've been up to for the last few months sewing-wise.



How did you become a quilter?

How would you describe your quilting style?

I really enjoy traditional patterns but I do go outside the box occasionally. Scrappy quilts are one of my go to quilting styles but applique is my ultimate favorite.

What is your best quilting tip?

When you are finished your project cut up your scraps into manageable pieces. I cut 2 ½" strips and squares. Five inch squares come in handy as well. I put them in labeled boxes so when a project calls for those sizes I am ready.





What do you do with the quilts you make?

I make guilts for family and friends. I also do a lot of guilts for charity. I do keep a few for myself.

What is the best part of the quilt guild meetings?

I like all aspects of the meeting. Program is my particular favorite because I like learning new things. I love the show and share because seeing the quilts that others have made is very inspiring.

What I remember from my first meetings at the guild was that they were speaking a whole new language. Scant ¼", sandwich, basting, fat quarter were just a few of the words that I had to learn the meanings of. The members were very friendly and inviting and I felt right at home. 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

So what have you been doing while at home Renee B?



UFO Boronia handbag I finished.









PIZZA SOUP

Tasty and quick!

(supper club - Dorothy Y)

The recipe was shared by Mary F. Thanks for this ...

Ingredients:

- 1 onion chopped
- 1 cup sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 green pepper, chopped
- 2 cans diced or stewed tomatoes (796 ml)
- 1 cup water (Oxo to make beef stock)
- 1 cup thinly sliced pepperoni

dried basil to taste (I generally sprinkle a layer to cover the surface of whichever pot I'm using - or - fresh or frozen, in which case you'll need more.)

1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese







Method:

- Saute onions, mushrooms and green peper in a bit of oil until just soft.
- -Add tomatoes, beef stock (Oxo + H2O), pepperoni and basil, and cook until thoroughly heated.
- -Sprinkle cheese on bottom of bowls, then ladle in soup. Also delicious without cheese!

Notes:

We added carrots. Cut the sausage in chunks rather than slices. Added macaroni. It was delicious. **ENJOY!**

Safe and Interesting Activity #1



Wesley's Gem

For centuries Christian art has inspired, taught, and uplifted the spirit. Wesley United Church shares in that tradition with the three beautiful mosaics embedded in our west exterior wall. The lavish colour and the joyous flow of the ceramic mosaic pieces, as they stream through the elements of the visuals, enrich our appreciation of, and insight into, the Biblical scriptures depicted.

In the late 1950's and early 1960's, when Wesley's early volunteers were planning and building our present home, they selected local artist Lorraine Malach to create an expression of our commitment to our Christian heritage. Lorraine, who died in Drumheller, Alberta in 2003, was born in Regina in 1933. She studied at the Regina College School of Art under Kenneth Lockhead and Arthur McKay. She also studied Honours Painting at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia while simultaneously attending the prestigious Barnes Foundation in Merion, Pennsylvania. As well, Lorraine was awarded several highly coveted Study Tour Awards, resulting in study in Florence, Italy and Istanbul, Turkey.

Lorraine returned to Regina in 1958. She worked as an art instructor for the Department of Extension Programs, Regina Campus, University of Saskatchewan, as well as in various locations throughout the province. Lorraine was not only a talented artist; she was also a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church, though she disagreed with some of its tenets relating to women. Her Christian faith led to commissions to create works in a number of Regina churches; in St. Michael's Retreat House, Lumsden; and in Notre Dame Church, Port Alberni B.C.; to mention a few. Lorraine's work also appears in the Sturdy-Stone Building in Saskatoon, and in many public collections including the Saskatchewan Arts Board, the Government of Saskatchewan and the Vatican Collection. Perhaps the major work of her life is "The Story of Life", composed of 10 tonnes of clay, in the main hall of the Royal Tyrrell Museum in Drumheller, Alberta.

But--Lorraine's very first ceramic church murals were created for our own Wesley United Church and installed in our Chapel exterior west wall in 1963. Yes, we possess the historic first piece of Malach church art!

A framed picture of the mosaics with explanatory text, which formerly hung on an interior wall at Wesley, describes the meaning of the mosaics as follows:

Research team has isolated the COVID-19 virus





A team of researchers from Sunnybrook, McMaster University and the University of Toronto has isolated severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2), the agent responsible for the ongoing outbreak of COVID-19.

Thanks to nimble collaboration, the team was able to culture the virus from two clinical specimens in a Level 3 containment facility. "We need key tools to develop solutions to this pandemic. While the immediate response is crucial, longer-term solutions come from essential research into this novel virus," said Dr. Samira Mubareka, microbiologist and infectious diseases physician at Sunnybrook.

The isolated virus will help researchers in Canada and across the world develop better diagnostic testing, treatments and vaccines, and gain a better understanding of SARS-CoV-2 biology, evolution and clinical shedding.

"Researchers from these world-class institutions came together in a grassroots way to successfully isolate the virus in just a few short weeks," said Dr. Rob Kozak, clinical microbiologist at Sunnybrook. "It demonstrates the amazing things that can happen when we collaborate."

Dr. Arinjay Banerjee, NSERC post-doctoral fellow at McMaster University, said he knows the collaboration won't stop there. "Now that we have isolated the SARS-CoV-2 virus, we can share this with other researchers and continue this teamwork," he said. "The more viruses that are made available in this way, the more we can learn, collaborate and share."

Congratulations to the researchers from these three Canadian institutions: Dr. Samira Mubareka and Dr. Rob Kozak of Sunnybrook and University of Toronto; Dr. Arinjay Banerjee and Dr. Karen Mossman of McMaster University.

Our library had a busy year, even if it was shortened.

We had a generous donation of books; with the help of Shelby L we sorted through them and some were retained for the library. The majority were offered up for sale (along with those culled from our library) and with the help of new library committee members, Wendy B and Kathy W we took in over a \$100.

Debbie W has been busy ordering books—19 new books as asked for by you, the members at a cost of \$466.52. Debbie was able to obtain all but one of the books our members requested.

We were moved from the meeting hall to the Board Room which is just opposite the Ladies' Room. Thanks to a generous donation from Tannis F's business we now have new shelves that will not collapse.

All in all a good year; many thanks to my fellow committee members Linda W, Debbie W, Kathy W and Wendy B.

Newsletter Deena A.

Deena:

Until very recently, the 2019-2020 year was very normal for the Newsletter Committee. I tried a couple of changes; the first change was new *Meet the Member* questions. The focus was on the member as a quilter. The change was intended to see if making the questions less personal would encourage more people to participate. My opinion is that it did not make a difference to participation rates and I found that I missed learning something different about the featured members.

The second change was to the cover page. I put the President's message on the cover rather than on page 3. I found that the plain text as the first thing you see was quite dull and changed back to graphics after a couple of issues. Not sure yet what will happen in the fall but your opinions would be appreciated.

The balancing act continues between printing enough copies to cover demand but not too many to keep the cost down. I did not print any pages in colour this year. We stopped printing just before buying another set of copies. Lucky timing saved us 450.00. On average we printed 24 pages per issue and 95 copies per month. As of March 31, 2020 we had printed 15,892 pages well short of the normal 25,000.00. Advertising revenue pays for all the costs of the newsletter with a profit of around 300.00 that goes back to the general revenues of the guild.

Thank you to the committee directors for faithfully sending in their information. Also a thank you to everyone else and especially *Meet the Members* participants who provided content for the pages. Where would the newsletter be without its' faithful proofreaders - Mary F, Frances L, and Shelley K? Without all of your willing participation there wouldn't be a newsletter!

Frances:

For the 2019-2020 year, we added one half page (Carlye Sew and Sews) and one quarter page (Quilter on Fire) advertisers. They joined our loyal sponsors from previous years. We had 2 full page, 6 half page, 4 quarter page, and 7 business card advertisers. Not returning were Quarter Inch Quilting from Melfort, Haus of Stitches and Women on the Go.


