# Outdoor Quilt Show Held at Campbell

This pandemic has created a dilemma that we are all too familiar with. Businesses, schools, community organizations and others are pondering how to meet. Technology has helped tremendously, but it can never completely replace meetings in person.

The Prairie Piecemakers Quilters' Guild (PPQG) has been meeting since September via Zoom. They discussed trying to have smaller meetings or finding a venue where they could properly social distance, but neither felt like a safe option. As you can imagine, the average age of their membership puts many in the high-risk category.

One of the absolute joys of this group is that when members meet, they show their finished quilts. Every quilt is unique and often reflects the personality of the individual who created it, but this is one area where technology just can't do justice. Seeing a quilt in person and examining it up close is much better than the view through a laptop or cell phone camera. And when the world shut down in mid-March, many quilters in the group used their time to create a lot of quilts.

The PPQG decided they should attempt a way to get together outdoors and show their quilts. But where? They looked at parking lots and inquired about using outdoor spaces but were faced with another issue. How do you hang the quilts? One of the clever PPQG members went to a few Regina schools and looked at their parking lots and fences. Regina's largest high school, Campbell Collegiate, was perfect. It hosts a large parking lot and a few hundred metres of tall chain-link fencing.

A conversation with Regina Public School Division Office staff put the group in the right direction and led them to finding a home for the event. Members of the quilting group recognized this was a big request, considering they were asking this in the midst of schools getting ready to take students back after nearly six months.

In the end, the Prairie Piecemakers Quilters' Guild held their outdoor quilt show on Saturday, September 12<sup>th</sup>. The weather cooperated and the chain-link fence running alongside Campbell, on the south side parking lot, was filled with more than 80 colourful quilts. The show lasted two hours, and about 120 members and friends came to see the show at some point during the time.

Even though the event was held outside, every single person attending wore a mask and kept a safe distance. The setup also allowed members who are immunocompromised to slowly drive along the fence to look at the quilts.

Members of the PPQG are very grateful to the staff of Campbell Collegiate and Regina Public Schools for helping them to achieve this safe event. It was great to see the quilts but even better for a lot of the members, who are feeling extra isolated, to see each other, talk and look at the artfully made creations hanging in front of them. A huge thanks to everyone involved!

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# Ruth Bader Ginsburg Biography (1933–2020)







### exerpts from the website:

Ruth Bader Ginsburg graduated from Columbia Law School, going on to become a staunch courtroom advocate for the fair treatment of women and working with the ACLU's Women's Rights Project. She was appointed by President <a href="Jimmy Carter">Jimmy Carter</a> to the U.S. Court of Appeals in 1980 and appointed to the Supreme Court by President <a href="Bill Clinton">Bill Clinton</a> in 1993.

Ginsburg was born Joan Ruth Bader on March 15, 1933, in Brooklyn, New York. The second daughter of Nathan and Celia Bader, she grew up in a low-income, working-class neighborhood in Brooklyn. Ginsburg's mother, who was a major influence in her life, taught her the value of independence and a good education.

Ginsburg earned her bachelor's degree in government from Cornell University in 1954, finishing first in her class. She married law student Martin D. Ginsburg that same year.

After clerking for U.S. District Judge Edmund L. Palmieri (1959–61), Ginsburg taught at Rutgers University Law School (1963–72) and at Columbia (1972–80), where she became the school's first female tenured professor. During the 1970s, she also served as the director of the Women's Rights Project of the American Civil Liberties Union, for which she argued six landmark cases on gender equality before the U.S. Supreme Court.

One of the five cases she won before the Supreme Court involved a portion of the Social Security Act that favored women over men because it granted certain benefits to widows but not widowers.

Despite her reputation for restrained writing, she gathered considerable attention for her dissenting opinion in the case of Bush v. Gore, which effectively decided the 2000 presidential election between <u>George W. Bush</u> and <u>Al Gore</u>. Objecting to the court's majority opinion favoring Bush, Ginsburg deliberately and subtly concluded her decision with the words, "I dissent" — a significant departure from the tradition of including the adverb "respectfully."

In 2015, Ginsburg sided with the majority in two landmark Supreme Court rulings. On June 25th she was one of the six justices to uphold a critical component of the 2010 Affordable Care Act — often referred to as Obamacare — in King v. Burwell. The decision allows the federal government to continue providing subsidies to Americans who purchase health care through "exchanges," regardless of whether they are state or federally operated. The majority ruling, read by <a href="Chief Justice John Roberts">Chief Justice John Roberts</a>, was a massive victory for <a href="President Barack Obama">President Barack Obama</a> and made the Affordable Care Act difficult to undo. Conservative justices <a href="Clarence Thomas">Clarence Thomas</a>, <a href="Samuel Alito">Samuel Alito</a> and <a href="Antonin Scalia">Antonin Scalia</a> were in dissent, with Scalia presenting a scathing dissenting opinion to the Court.

In 2016 Ginsburg released My Own Words, a memoir filled with her writings that date as far back as her junior high school years. The book became a New York Times Best Seller.

In January 2018 Ginsburg appeared at the Sundance Film Festival to accompany the premiere of the documentary RBG. Touching on the #MeToo movement, she recalled an earlier time when she had to put up with the advances of a Cornell University professor. She also gave her seal of approval for <a href="Kate McKinnon">Kate McKinnon</a> 's sassy portrayal of her on Saturday Night Live, noting, "I would like to say 'Ginsburned' sometimes to my colleagues."

Ginsburg died on September 18, 2020, at her home in Washington, D.C., from complications of metastatic pancreatic cancer.

# **Somalia**

Somalia, easternmost country of Africa, on the Horn of Africa. It extends from just south of the Equator northward to the Gulf of Aden and occupies an important geopolitical position between sub-Saharan Africa and the countries of Arabia and southwestern Asia. The capital, Mogadishu, is located just north of the Equator on the Indian Ocean.

### **History**

The Republic of Somalia was formed in 1960 by the federation of a former Italian colony and a British protectorate. Mohamed Siad Barre (Maxamed Siyaad Barre) held dictatorial rule over the country from October 1969 until January 1991, when he was overthrown in a bloody civil war waged by clanbased guerrillas. After Siad's fall from power, warfare continued and the country lacked an

effective centralized government—problems that persisted into the 21st century. Moreover, a de facto government declared the formation of an independent Republic of Somaliland in the north in 1991. Similarly, in 1998 the autonomous region of Puntland (the Puntland State of Somalia) was self-proclaimed in the northeast.

Decades of civil hostilities have virtually destroyed Somalia's economy and infrastructure and split the country into areas under the rule of various entities. When Somalia's tenuous transitional administration handed power to a new government in 2012, the newly declared Federal Republic of Somalia had only limited control over the country. There was, however, hope that the new government would usher in a new era, one in which peace would be achieved and Somalis could focus on rebuilding their country.

### **Ethnic groups**

The Somali people make up the overwhelming majority of Somalia's population. They are divided into numerous clans, which are groups that trace their common ancestry back to a single father. These clans, which in turn are subdivided into numerous subclans, combine at a higher level to form clan families.

The clan families inhabiting the interfluvial area of southern Somalia are the Rahanwayn and the Digil, which together are known as the Sab. Mainly farmers and agropastoralists, the Sab include both original inhabitants and numerous Somali groups that have immigrated into this climatically favourable area. Other clan families are the Daarood of northeastern Somalia, the Ogaden, and the border region between

Somalia and Kenya; the Hawiye, chiefly inhabiting the area on both sides of the middle Shabeelle and south-central Somalia; and the Isaaq, who live in the central and western parts of northern Somalia. In addition, there are the Dir, living in the northwestern corner of the country but also dispersed throughout southern Somalia, and the Tunni, occupying the stretch of coast between Marca and Kismaayo. Toward the Kenyan border the narrow coastal strip and offshore islands are inhabited by the Bagiunis, a Swahili fishing people.

According to the 2016 National Census, 62,550 people in Canada reported Somali ancestry. Of those, 37,115 were Somali language speakers and 4,315 were recent immigrants.

Somalis tend to be concentrated in the southern part of the province of Ontario, especially in Ottawa and Toronto. The Albertan cities of Calgary and Edmonton have also seen a significant increase in their respective Somali communities. The neighbourhood of Rexdale in Toronto has one of the largest Somali populations in the country.

### **Textiles**

Even in the 19th century, a French geographer estimated, one out of every five persons in Mogadishu was a weaver. The fields of the Jubaland Plain were polkadotted with cotton plants, and Somalis produced over 350,000 pieces of cloth annually from the fertile ground. Because the ginning and weaving processes traditionally fell to lower-caste Somali tribes, the product was cheap enough to export successfully to countries like India, Egypt, and Kenya. The white cloth was also the Somali national dress: One length of it, known in traders' Arabic as futa, wrapped every man's waist as a long skirt, with another shorter piece, called go, draped the torso like a shawl. Women wore a long wrap called guntino.

By the last decade of the last century, however, the white futa Benaadiri had been completely replaced by merikan, a grey sheeting manufactured by the United States to the dimensions of the Somali skirt. A length of it sold for one Maria Theresa thaler, and soon became interchangeable with that coin, developing into a kind of money known as cloth currency.

The introduction of European-style clothing by the Italian colonists, and a drop in the world cotton market that made production and transportation of merikan very competitive with indigenous industries, were abstract market forces that led to the near-eradication of futa Benaadiri But recent research also suggests an attempt by wealthy Indian merchants to drive out the local cloth and capture the intermediary trade.

Today, as a result, Somalia's southern ports of Merca and Brava no longer bustle with commerce, and their medieval fortifications crumble in the wind and tides. Today, only about 1,500 weavers nationwide carry on the trade that once flourished throughout the towns of the Benaadir Coast, struggling quietly against the onslaught of mass-produced synthetics. In steaming alleys away from the main thoroughfares - where local merchants today display sparkling textiles from Korea and Japan - the weaver's cooperatives silently sell their handmade products, moving their inventory slowly and patiently. So far, the weavers have survived, against the odds.

### Color theory and the color wheel

Ever wondered how designers and artists find the perfect color combination? They use color theory. Color theory is a practical combination of art and science that's used to determine what colors look good together. The color wheel was invented in 1666 by Isaac Newton, who mapped the color spectrum onto a circle. The color wheel is the basis of color theory, because it shows the relationship between colors.

Colors that look good together are called a color harmony. Artists and designers use these to create a particular look or feel. You can use a color wheel to find color harmonies by using the rules of color combinations. Color combinations determine the relative positions of different colors in order to find colors that create a pleasing effect.

There are two types of color wheel. The RYB or red, yellow, blue color wheel is typically used by artists, as it helps with combining paint colors. Then there is the RGB, or red, green and blue color wheel, which is designed for online use, as it refers to mixing light – like on a computer or TV screen. Canva's color wheel is an RGB color wheel, as it is designed for online use.

### Hexagon Color Wheel



I am often asked about the use of the color wheel when selecting fabrics for quilts. While most wheels we are familiar with have twelve spokes, I had been planning on making one with eighteen spokes for quite some time. Eighteen spokes gives further nuances of yellow, yellow-orange, orange-yellow, orange, orange-red, red-orange, etc.

When I saw this English Paper Pieced (EPP) wall hanging in the September 2011 issue of *The Quilt Pattern Magazine* ("PinPal Wallhanging" designed by Judy Damon), I decided to make it. All 37 different colors of fabric used in the hexagons came from my stash.

I machine quilted it using threads that closely matched the color of each hexagon, in the traditional 1/4" away from each seam. Took a lot of thread changes, but I like the overall affect.



- (i) Consider such other business as may be properly brought before the meeting
- (j) Appoint a person who meets the qualifications as prescribed in the NPA regulations to review the financial statements
- (iii) The purpose of the AGM shall be to:

- (b) Consider the Financial Statements
- (c) Consider the Reviewer's report


